






HR DANCE COMMITTEE

Ways to Reduce the Amount of Trash You Create

A way to help the planet is to simply cut down on the amount of non-recyclable materials you throw out. What's a good way to do this? One of the most effective ways to help us to bring your own reusable bag to purchase groceries. If you forget, insist on paper, and pack as many goods in one bag as possible, without double bagging.

- 1. Try to reduce the amount of packaging you purchase by buying products in bulk.
- 2. Have any paper statements that are normally mailed to you such as bills, financial statements, newsletters, etc. e-mailed to you instead.
- 3. Buy products that are packaged in cardboard or paper board instead of Styrofoam.
- 4. Try to avoid disposable items such as paper plates, cups, and utensils.

When wrapping presents, opt for reusable gift

bags instead of wrapping paper – or maybe even reuse wrapping paper.



We've varied but interesting offerings this month. The first is one that our book club just finished called The Storied Life of A.J.Fikry. We gave it high marks. Its the story of a book store owner, the changes caused by the advent of a baby found among the shelves, and the evolving lives of all involved. It takes place on a small (fictional) island off the coast of New England and shows the influence a book store can have. An absolutely delightful book, it encompassing mystery, romance and the foibles of human nature. The Orphans's Tale by Pam Jenoff takes place during WW II. A sixteen year old snatches a baby from a box car filled with Jewish baby's destined for a concentration camp. In order to protect herself and the child she joins a German circus where she learns the flying trapeze act but is in competition with the lead aerialist. Rivals at first they become fast friends but detection is always imminent. They ... "must decide whether their friendship is enough to save one another – or if the secrets that burn between them will destroy everything."

Elin Hilderbrand's The Identicals (large print) is the story of twins with decidedly different personalities. When their parents divorced they each kept one twin. One is "laid-back, easygoing. She likes a beer and a shot and wouldn't be caught dead wearing anything fashionable. She's inherited her fathers run down house on Martha's Vineyard." The other is "dignified, refined. She prefers a good wine and has inherited the impeccable taste of her mother, the iconic fashion designer...and a fashion boutique on Nantucket....Before the last beach picnic of the season, there will be enough old resentments, new loves, and cases of mistaken identity to make this the most talked – about summer that Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket have experience in ages."

The Fall Line, how American ski racers conquered a sport on the edge by Nathaniel Vinton is the true story of young American racers who challenged the dominance of the Alpine racing world. "Led by Bode Miller and Lindsey Vonn, Julia Mancuso and Ted Ligety, this band of iconoclasts made a place for their country on some of the world's most prestigious race courses." Including the Olympic Winter Games.

Chaplain's Chat

FOURWORDSFORLOVE

In 1960, legendary British scholar, author and Oxford professor <u>C. S. Lewis</u> wrote the compelling book, THE FOUR LOVES, detailing the words in the Greek language that are all translated into English as LOVE: <u>phileo</u> – <u>friendship love</u>, <u>storge</u> - <u>family love</u>, <u>eros</u>- <u>romantic love</u>, <u>and <u>agape</u> – <u>sacrificial love</u> (John 3:16 – "...God so loved (agape) the world that he <u>gave His only begotten Son..."</u>).</u>

The first three words are used widely in secular Greek literature, but the Greek word *agape* was a unique word used only in Scripture to describe God's self-giving compassion that sacrifices self and gives one's life to save others.

This revolutionary kind of love changes us, and changes everything!

When God came to earth that first Christmas morning, the eternal Creator- God wrapped in a baby's flesh, He came as the incarnation of agape – the God-Man who would give His life on a Cross to prove how much He loves all the world's people and to save all who would believe in Him from their sins.

In John 20:21, before going to the Cross, Jesus taught His followers, "As the Father has sent me, so send I you". God the Father had sent His only Son to rescue the worlds people who had all wandered far from God, to LOVE (agape) US BACK TO HIM, and now Jesus (God the Son) sends all His 21st century followers to agape others the same way.

ARE WE DOING IT? Are we demonstrating to our HR neighbors and friends how much God loves them, by loving and serving them sacrificially in Jesus' Name?

If we who have been rescued by *agape* are transformed by it, we will pour out our lives for others as Jesus did for us.

"They will know we are Christians by our love (agape)!"

And may we never forget that *agape* includes inviting folks to **believe** and **receive** (John 1:12), that they may enjoy the amazing forgiveness, freedom and joy that only a personal commitment to Christ can bring. This month I would like to talk about pet fostering. Becoming a foster for a rescue or humane organization is usually pretty simple and extremely gratifying. Most organizations will require that you complete an application and that any personal pets you have be current on their vaccinations. Some will require a home visit to see where you plan to house the pet. The best part of fostering is you have more than likely saved a life as many rescues rely on foster parents to be able to rescue a dog or cat from a high kill shelter. Here in Highlands County that is especially true.

At Sebring Angels Rescue, Inc. we focus primarily on dogs on the euthanasia list at the Highlands County Animal Services. Animal Services is now administered and supervised by the Sheriffs Department and the changes have been very positive. However the county shelter is an open admission animal shelter, which means it cannot turn an animal way, consequently when overcrowding occurs they must slate some dogs for euthanasia. The fair way to do that is usually the dogs who have been there the longest. Each week a list is released and our sister group "Sebring Urgents Save Us", begins a social media campaign and networking effort to get these dogs rescued.

When we sponsor a dog it is immediately brought to one of the area veterinarians who work with us. The dog is given a health check, vaccinated and spayed or neutered. Then they are ready to go to their foster. We supply their leash, collar, food and heart worm and flea/tick preventative. The foster parents give them the love and routine they need to prepare them for adoption. We do ask our fosters to provide pictures for us to be able to promote the dog on social media and on the various adoption websites. We also take part in regional adoption events and fosters or organization volunteers will bring the dogs to events.

Statistically it has been found that dogs who have been fostered instead of kenneled are more likely to have a successful adoption to a forever home. We feel very blessed to have very dedicated fosters in our rescue, but there are never enough. In the next few months we will be holding several foster orientations and would love to have you join us. What is Mahjong?

Mahjong is a game of both skill and luck that originated in China many centuries ago and was brought to the West in the 1920's with the publication of Joseph Park Babcock's "Rules of Mah-Jongg." American mahjong (also sometimes spelled "**Mah Jongg**" or called "**Maajh**") is unique from Asian mahjong in several ways. American mahjong utilizes racks, jokers, "Hands and Rules" score cards and has several distinct gameplay mechanics. Although an American mahjong set can be used to play Chinese Mahjong, the rules that follow are for the American game.

Mahjong is always played with four players seated around a table. Tiles are shuffled, die are cast, and rituals involving the allocation of tiles and then the exchange of tiles begin. The first person to match a hand of 14 tiles and thus "call mahjong" ends the game, whereupon tiles are scored and a winner is declared.

The excitement of mahjong lies in the decisions that you will constantly have to make. Is it preferable to discard a tile and thus gain an advantage, or would it be more prudent to stay with a decent hand? There is the exhilaration of winning a hand as well as regret at not having been bold enough to have made a different choice. Like poker, you will learn a lot about your opponents as you play mahjong and adjust your strategy according to their strengths and weaknesses.


