

HIGHLANDS RIDGE RECYCLING

Recycling Your Cardboard!

When not wet or contaminated with food or oil, cardboard is recyclable. It is also naturally biodegradable, but it's always a good idea to put it in the recycling bin instead of leaving it as litter.

Frequent Cardboard Recycling Questions

<u>Do tape and labels need to be removed from cardboard before recycling?</u>

Tape and labels can be left on cardboard, as they are usually removed at recycling facilities.

Will anyone buy cardboard?

Yes, but corrugated cardboard is abundant and the market demand for the material isn't nearly as high as other materials. It is generally bought and sold in bulk.

Can wet cardboard be recycled?

No. Wet cardboard can clog the automated sorting machines that are used at most recycling and sorting facilities. Throw wet cardboard in the trash to avoid contaminating an entire recycling load.

Can pizza boxes be recycled?

The corrugated cardboard in pizza boxes is itself recyclable, but like any paper product, cardboard is no longer recyclable once it is tarnished with grease or food.

<u>Do boxes need to be broken down before recycling?</u>
Yes. Boxes that aren't fully flattened are much more difficult to transport and present problems for mechanisms in the cardboard recycling process.

Mind Games by Iris Johansen takes us to Scotland and the continued search for a treasure that Jane Mac-Guire has hunted for years. This is a fast paced, intriguing read with some mysticism, mystery, highlands history and romance.

John Grisham's The Rooster Bar deals with a law school that turns out mediocre students who can barely get, or not get a job. To further complicate matters the school is aligned with a bank that offers student loans and encourages massive debt. "Mark, Todd and Zola came to law school to change the world, … but now as third-year students, these close friends realize they have been duped." How they work there way out makes for a very interesting read and a rather Hitchcock type ending.


The Underground Railroad by Colson Whitehead follows a slave on a cotton plantation in Georgia, her escape and the various people and places she encounters. It uses fact and fantasy to tell the "tale of one woman's ferocious will to escape the horrors of bondage and a shattering, powerful meditation on the history we all share."

Our book discussion group read it and most of us found it powerfully moving.

The Cosmic Cocktail, Three parts dark matter by Katherine Freese, is the non fiction offering this month and was donated by our friend Jim Norris. "The ordinary atoms that make up the known universe – from our

bodies and the air we breathe to the planets and stars – constitute only 5 percent of all matter and energy in the cosmos." The rest is dark matter. Freese is attempting to solve the mystery of what the universe is made of and is, at the very least, providing a foundation for continued study.

One of the most difficult aspects of being in pet rescue is when we receive a call from a family who has inherited a pet as a result of the death of the pet owner and the family is either unwilling or unable to continue to care for that pet. The pet is usually suffering from grief and now has not only lost their human companion but also their home. It is truly a heartbreaking situation. Often they are surrendered to a shelter where the animal does not acclimate to their new chaotic surroundings and are subsequently euthanized. We at Sebring Angels are a foster based rescue, so are better prepared to care for these pets.

Recently we attended a seminar given by 2nd Chance 4 Pets (www,2ndchance4pets.org), where they explained their mission of educating the pet owner about how to ensure their pets will receive the same type of care they currently provide. They outline 3 steps: 1. Identify Caregivers 2. Prepare written instructions 3. Set up a fund.

- 1. Identify people who would be willing to care for your pets in the hours, days, or weeks after an emergency as well as those who would be willing to adopt your pets should you did or become incapacitated.
- 2. Prepare written instructions outlining how your pets should be cared for. To make sure your wishes are followed, you must document your instructions and let others know where these instructions are located.
- 3. You currently pay for food, supplies, and medical care for your pets. Should anything happen to you these expenses still need to be covered. Consider setting aside funds to cover temporary or permanent care of your pets. Professionals who can help you include estate planners, financial planners and your life insurance company. Take into consideration the amount you spend each year on your pets and the life expectancy of the pets.

2nd chance 4 pets provides several wonderful resources to assist you in this preparation including a Pet Care Workbook and care instruction forms which can be found on their website which I have listed above.

Over the coming months Sebring Angels will be working with Cornerstone Hospice and their Pet Peace of Mind Program. Our hope is to be able to establish a program where we can make our rescue available to people who do not have any family or friends who can care for their pets if the need arises. By entering into an agreement with our rescue, we become that designated caregiver. To facilitate this program we will be recruiting fosters families to help us provide temporary loving homes for these pets as we seek a permanent adopter. I will be updating through this column as the program develops.
