

Glass Recycling

Did you know that most glass is INFINITELY and COMPLETLEY recyclable! This means that foodgrade glass can be recycled again & again & again! This reduces energy usage and extends the life of equipment, such as furnaces. Recycling glass can offset your carbon footprint, if you recycled just 5 glass containers a week, you'd be saving enough energy to power a compact fluorescent bulb for 35 hours! Unfortunately there is NO glass recycling in Highlands County, recyclers who don't accept glass have good reasons for it. The weight of glass makes it too costly to transport, glass breaks at curbside pickup and can injure workers, as well as contaminating other recyclables and additionally that it is too difficult to separate out different types and colors of glass. Colored glass needs to be recycled with like colors only, certain minerals are added to create different glass colors, and so the same color glass needs to be recycled together in order to produce like colored glass. Pyrex and other types of tempered glass are not recyclable, because of how they are manufactured to withstand high temperatures. Glass is great for upcycling projects. If your recycler no longer accepts glass, don't despair. Instead, get crafty. Glass jars and bottles can be used for decorative storage, to make candleholders or vases, as well as coin banks or birdfeeders. And if projects aren't your thing, consider donating the jars to a local school or art program. Do not worry though, I will still be asking the county when we can expect our glass recycling program to start again.

First on tap this month is "Flood" by Stephen Baxter. The Washington Post called it horrifyingly believable. It starts out with four hostages rescued who have been held captive for five years. They vow to always keep in touch, never realizing the world changes that have taken place. Water is rising everywhere. First beach front disappears, then cities, then states. The struggle for high ground and survival deals with all aspects of human nature. Our Highlands Ridge Book Discussion group found it to be an interesting and compelling read. "Mistress of Nothing" by Kate Pullinger was recommended by one of our book club members. The book is based on the real lives of Lady Duff Gordon and her maid. It takes place in Victorian times and provides an interesting picture of life in Egypt. Although the two women forged a bond in a strange land it could not overcome the power of race, class and love.

Robert B. Parker's "The Hangman's Sonnet" by Reed Farrel Coleman is a Jesse Stone novel and takes us again to Paradise, a seacoast town outside of Boston. It provides some fast reading entertainment as it is sprinkled with murder, alcoholism, politics, criminals and celebrities.

Our nonfiction offering this month is "Cut Loose – jobless and hopeless in an unfair economy" by Victor Tan Chen. "Years after the Great Recession, the economy is still weak, and an unprecedented number of workers have suffered long spells of unemployment." The book provides "a vivid and moving account of the experiences of some of these men and women by studying a historically important group: autoworkers. There well-paid jobs on the assembly lines built a strong middle class in the decades after World War II. But today they find themselves beleaguered in a changed economy of greater inequality and risk, one that favors the well-educated – or well connected"

We've the movie "Quartet" on DVD. Directed by Dustin Hoffman and staring Maggie Smith, Tom Courtenay, Billy Connolly, Pauline Collins and Michael Gambon it relays the story of friends, all residents of Beecham House, a home for retired musicians. "Quartet is a joyous and entertaining film about music, love and second changes."

The Highlands Ridge Book Discussion Group will meet on April 12 at 1:30 in the library. Book to be discussed is The Color of Water by James McBride.

CRITTER CORNER

Spring is right around the corner and time for spring spruce up! That goes for your dog or cat as well. Recently I was asked what the major problem we see in rescue, especially when we take in a senior pet when an owner can no longer care for them. Well this may seem repetitive, unfortunately it is still heartworm disease. Many people still believe their "house pet" is not at risk, when in fact it only takes one mosquito to cause heart worms. Preventative is relatively inexpensive and easy to give. In addition we also see other parasites, including hookworms, roundworms and tapeworms. These parasites live year round in our yards where we never experience a hard frost to slow down their proliferation. Annual health checkups are essential for our pets. At that visit a heartworm test should be performed and a stool sample to check for parasites. Of course annual vaccinations updated and an overall check of your pet. Your veterinarian will also look for dental issues and discuss your pets diet. Obesity in our pet population is as much a problem as it is with people. Table food is not a healthy alternative for our pets because of increased fats and additives. Healthy alternatives are raw vegetables, which my dogs receive as treats instead of biscuits. Most dogs love raw vegetables, especially carrots and green beans. The internet and Pinterest are full of recipes for healthy treats for dogs. My dogs always know when I am baking for them, staying close by the oven where the yummy smells are coming from. One of the benefits of a healthy diet is good skin and coat condition. Last, but certainly not least, is your pets appearance! A good bath will help loosen and remove dander, undercoat and any dirt and pollen your dog has accumulated over the winter months. If bathing your dog is too difficult a task for you there are many reputable groomers in the area. They will not only bathe your dog, but will also clip nails, clean ears and eyes and check your dog for unusual lumps. Our dogs always emerge from the groomer looking like they feel good about themselves again. It is certainly the first thing we do with a rescue dog to give them a clean start. In conclusion please remember to pick up after your dogs, as it keeps our environment safer and far healthier for all our pets. All dogs must be leashed in Highlands Ridge, and please practice good dog etiquette by keeping your dog under control. As we age our skin becomes more fragile and something as simple as an exuberant dog jumping up can cause lacerations. Dogs and cats can bring so much joy to our lives and for many of us it makes our home complete, so we owe it to them to take the care of them like a family member.




