Book Club News

Finally, after having to cancel the October club meeting, we were able to get together in the Pagoda on November 19th and had a discussion of Celeste Ng's novel "Little Fires Everywhere". Set in Shaker Heights, a progressive, suburb of Cleveland where everything is "planned", you meet Elena Richardson whose guiding principle is playing by the rules.

Moving to the community is Mia Warren, an artist and single mother who arrives in this idyllic bubble with her teenage daughter, Pearl. "Little Fires Everywhere" explores the weight of secrets, the nature of art and identity and the ferocious pull of motherhood. Can following the rules really avert disaster? This was a great read: pick up a copy in your community library!

For our December meeting, we read "The Bookwoman of Troublesome Creek", by Kim Michelle Richardson. The hardscrabble folks of Troublesome Creek have to scarp for everything—everything except books, that is. Thanks to Roosevelt's Kentucky Pack Horse Library Project, Troublesome's got its very own traveling librarian, Cussy Mary Carter.

Cussy's not only a book woman, however, she's also the last of her kind, her skin a shade of blue unlike most anyone else. Not everyone is keen on Cussy's family or the Library Project, and a Blue is often blamed for any whiff of trouble. If Cussy wants to bring the joy of books to the hill folks, she's going to have to confront prejudice as old as the Appalachia's and suspicion as deep as the holler.

Inspired by the true blue-skinned people of Kentucky and the brave and dedicated Kentucky Pack Horse library service of the 1930s, *The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek* is a story of raw courage, fierce strength, and one woman's belief that books can carry us anywhere—even back home. All book club members gave this book rave reviews. A recommended read for anyone.

Celeste Ng's first book, "Everything I Never Told You" is the topic for discussion at this month's meeting that will be held on the 21st in the pagoda. The stunning beginning of this book, the disappearance of the teenage daughter of a Chinese American family living in small town Ohio, grabs you and draws you into a profoundly moving story of family, secrets and longing.

In February, we will be discussing "The Girl with Seven Names", by Hyeonseo Lee. As a child, Lee was one of millions indoctrinated in North Korea by the world's most secretive and brutal regime. Having survived the chaos, starvation and repression of the Great Famine, she dared to escape to China in 1997 at the age of 17. This is her story.

As always, all are welcome to join our book club. We meet every month on the third Thursday of each month and have been doing so in the pagoda to ensure our safety.

Spring is right around the corner, and time for spring spruce up! That goes for your dog, or cat, as well. Recently I was asked what the major problem we see in rescue, especially when we take in a senior pet when an owner can no longer care for them. Well this may seem repetitive, unfortunately it is still heartworm disease. Many people still believe their “house pet” is not at risk, when in fact it only takes one mosquito to cause heart worms. Preventative is relatively inexpensive and easy to give. In addition we also see other parasites, including hookworms, roundworms, and tapeworms. These parasites live year round in our yards where we never experience a hard frost to slow down their proliferation.

Annual health checkups are essential for our pets. At that visit a heartworm test should be performed, and a stool sample to check for parasites. Of course annual vaccinations updated, and an overall check of your pet. Your veterinarian will also look for dental issues, and discuss your pets diet. Obesity in our pet population is as much a problem as it is with people. Table food is not a healthy alternative for our pets because of increased fats and additives. Healthy alternatives are raw vegetables, which my dogs receive as treats instead of biscuits. Most dogs love raw vegetables, especially carrots and green beans. The internet and Pinterest are full of recipes for healthy treats for dogs. My dogs always know when I am baking for them, staying close by the oven where the yummy smells are coming from. One of the benefits of a healthy diet is good skin and coat condition.

Last, but certainly not least, is your pets appearance! A good bath will help loosen and remove dander, undercoat and any dirt and pollen your dog has accumulated over the winter months. If bathing your dog is too difficult a task for you, there are many reputable groomers in the area. They will not only bathe your dog, but will also clip nails, clean ears, and eyes, and check your dog for unusual lumps. Our dogs always emerge from the groomer looking like they feel good about themselves again. It is certainly the first thing we do with a rescue dog to give them a clean start.

In conclusion please remember to pick up after your dogs, as it keeps our environment safer, and far healthier for all our pets. Please practice good dog etiquette, by keeping your dog under control. As we age our skin becomes more fragile and something as simple as an exuberant dog jumping up can cause lacerations. Dogs and cats can bring so much joy to our lives and for many of us it makes our home complete, so we owe it to them to take the care of them like a family member.

Hello everyone and welcome all new residents!!

Welcome back! The pool and the golf course are busy but lets remember to practice social distancing while we participate in these outdoor activities in the community!

Gym: is open. Remember, you must make an appointment with the office. During this pandemic, the gym is only open to 3 residents at one time. Please wipe the machine down before and after use. The gym is supplied with disinfectant wipes. If you have a guest that would like to use the gym; they must sign a waiver with the office. Please call and we will email you the form!

Activities rooms 1,2 and 3: are open to hold your activity/event. Each room has a wall hand sanitizer dispenser and a bottle of disinfectant along with paper towels. Call the office at 863-471-1115 to reserve or if you have any questions. A reservation is a must in order to use these rooms.

Golf Cart Safety: With season upon us here is Paradise, additional residents and guests will increase. Remember, you are responsible for your guests, please make sure they abide by the speed limit and stop at all stop signs. Golf carts are supposed to be driven with care and the driver should have a driver license.

Sealcoating Roads: The Hidden Creek village project has been rescheduled to the end of April 2021. We will email you with more details once the date gets closer!

Distribution Center: The center has the most common forms used at Highlands Ridge. You don't have to wait for the office to open because the center is open 24/7. The boxes are labeled. All these forms can be found on the website www.highlandsridge.com. Click on "Resident info," then look under "Commonly Requested Forms."

Marina Cove Residents: Please remind your vendors that they can't start work till 8:00 am. It is a rule in our rules and regulations of Marina Cove.

Friendly reminders:

1. Stop at all stop signs.
2. Speed limit is 20 mph.
3. Pets must be on a leash at all times and under control.
4. No signage other than a "for sale or for lease."
(this includes political signs)
5. MUST have prior approval before performing any type of work on the exterior of your home!
6. ALL golf cart drivers must be at least 16 yrs. of age to drive a golf cart within the community.
7. Do not drive through anyone else's yard except for your own with your golf cart or vehicle!
